- _____ : it is used when something happens earlier than expected. Its position is between have and the past participle. In Spanish, it can be translated as “ya”. Example: She has _____ finished.
- _____ : it is used when we want to say that something happened a short time ago. Its position is between have and the past participle. In Spanish, it can be translated as “acaba”. Example: She has _____ finished.
